PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE AGENDA:

Joe Chiaretti (from 336 West Main Street): I am here to talk about lowering the speed limit to 25 miles per hour. I want to support that position and I am sure that our police will support this, the trucks that are going down Main St. are going faster than 40 miles per hour. Mt Carmel has a 25 mile speed limit through town, Mahanoy City has a 25 mile per hour speed limit, Nesquehoning has a 25 mile speed limit and Lehighton has a 25 mile per mile speed limit. So, it is not unusual to take that position. Monday morning, I was out in Ashland, I took my wife to the 5th St. Dr.'s office and I was sitting there along Centre St., only to find out that all of the loaded trucks that are coming through Girardville, are also coming through Ashland all loaded, the empty ones are coming back through Girardville and going back up through Ashland's streets. I could not get over that. I took a ride uptown, from 3rd St. all the way up to May's Restaurant, there is not a single speed limit marker. I couldn't believe it. So, I called Danny Weikel, he's an old friend of mine, and I said "Danny, are you having any trouble with these trucks speeding through town?" He said, "Joe, it's a disgrace. I said, "well we are going to consider doing some 25 miles per hour speed limit in Girardville" and he said, "well, we are going to talk about it, it's on the Agenda. That and the Jake Brakes is driving the Community crazy". I was curious about

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this Jake Brake business so, I Googled Jake Brake, only to find out that there are actually only four states in the Country that forbid the use of Jake Brakes in their state, California, Oregon, Washington and Colorado. And interesting enough, on that same report it says that most Communities that are dealing with streets that are accompanied residential area, prohibit or discourage the use of Jake Breaks. So, I think that unless we reduce the speed mileage from 30 miles to 25, we are eventually going to have to deal with this Jake Brake business. Because I don't know whether there are a couple of guys slowing down, I spend a lot of time in the front of my house, that see me tinkering around and they blast the Jake Brakes. I gotta tell you, it's disturbing. But at any rate, I wanted to voice my concern that I totally support the lowering of the speed limit from 30 to 25 miles per hour. I encourage you to do everything you can to make that happen. Thank you.

PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE AGENDA:

Joe Chearetti: I have to ask the Borough Council to please be patient with me over my obsession with these trucks.

Betty Ann Bernosky: I am with you. I am right with you.

Annetta Whitecavage: I am, too. Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: Me, too.

Joe Chearetti: I told you before that I went up to the Gilberton Weigh Station, I found out that there are 300 trucks being weighed every day. One thing I noticed while I was standing talking to Ken, the Weighmaster, every truck had a weight of over 77,000 pounds. I left the Weigh Station, and I came home and I was thinking that there has to be something done about this so we can get something out of the usage on the streets. So, I called the Municipal Service Office for Schuylkill County in Allentown and I talked to a guy named John. Now he explained to me that there is not much that you do about it, because each truck pays a \$4,000 dollar tax. I am assuming that it is some kind of a usage tax, or highway use tax. Anyway, he told me that the legal weight limit on a truck is 73,280 pounds. These trucks are going up to Gilberton with two ton, 4,000 pounds heavier, so what do I do, I go back up to the weigh station and I ask the weighmaster "doesn't that bother you?" He said "no, not at all." It doesn't matter how much weight is on those trucks

because all that they are getting paid for is the 73,280 pounds, regardless of what it is, the truck driver and the owner of the truck gets paid for that 73,280 pounds. Now, when you think about it, 77,000 pounds verses 73,000 pounds, it's got to be making a mess out of our roads. So, I turned around and I made a little trip and I might ask the Council to try it. I drove from Julia Street, down to the West side, all the way up to Sosnoski's garage, nice and slow, now there is seven or eight places with significant bounces where it is obvious that the macadam is moving. But, there is two places where, one right across from the Post Office and the other one is right across from the old bank where there is three feet in diameter holes that are three to four inches deep and if you look real close, all of the macadam is breaking up. I bet you that within three or four months there will be two big potholes.

As a matter of fact, the way things are going, I am willing to bet you, if you drive from First Street in Ashland up to Fifth Street, you know you go under the traffic light, if you are not holding on to the steering wheel you lose control of the car. That's what Girardville's streets are going to look like, in my opinion. I challenge you guys to take that little trip, nice and slow up Girardville's streets. What's interesting is, you drive up from west to east and drive back down, because all of the trucks are empty it's smooth, not a thing wrong with it. I am telling you that, we are going to be just like Ashland's before too long, in my opinion that's what our streets will be like. And I congratulate the attempt the Borough on the efforts to reduce... The public thing in my opinion that we are going to be able to do before there is any further damage is to reduce weight. I went up to... to find out what it take's to get a weigh station set up and what do they allow. If they have a way, set up and you know that the 73,280 pounds, what if the weight is two pounds over the weight is it a fine, well is there an allowance?

OIC Jeremy Talanca: Well, I can't speak for the State Police. They may have different policies or practices, but they are pretty strict. And, I have spoken to the Mayor, President of Council, probably every one of them and we have a full-marked plan to combat this problem. That was one of the things that I also made the same phone call. Because our concern with the meeting and the weights of the trucks and those things, so that was another concern or part of our plan, in addition to painting more speed lines on upper and lower main where we can put them, so that we can track the speeds of the truck after it had accurately passed by. So, we actually have a plan to have about eight more sets of lines. We are working on this with Council, not only are we going to work the rigs, we are going to work on speeds, we are also going to work on the saturation patrols and we are trying to get other agencies to help us.

Joe Chieretti: I am glad to hear that. I was convinced that after everything was said and done, our only alternative was to reduce the speed and to reduce the loads.

Charles Marquardt: on the other issue with the bridges, I contacted Penn Dot. And what they told me that they do not bridge weight limit signs up, no longer. They do annual bridge inspections, if they deem the bridge to be unsafe based by the weight, they would put up a sign until they fix it, or if it is beyond repair, then they would close the bridge until it is fixed. They no longer put signs on them.

Robbie Krick: Well, that is stupid.

Charles Marquardt: That's what they told me.

Joe Chearetti: Well, if they lower the speed limit to 25 mph in Girardville, that would eliminate all the mud and everything on our cars.

Annetta Whitecavage: My windshield has a big cut

Charles Marquardt: They have a street sweeper that goes from Gilberton, cleans that place there. It goes from there, I guess that it goes over past your garage, right Rob? The highway out there?

Robbie Krick: Yes.

Charles Marquardt: Then it goes out past our plant. So, that guy goes constantly around.

Robbie Krick: It goes out Big Mine Run.

People talking over each other.

Edward Burns: They only have one sweeper to take care of it.

People talking over one another.

Joe Chearetti: I was out at UniMart and I went to open my door of the truck, there was one truck going this way and another truck going that way, there was hardly enough room for you to open up your door when two trucks are passing each other. I am surprised that someone hasn't got hurt already or a car accident. Like I said Charlie, if there is anything that I can do. I will even pay for the signs.

Mark Rainis: A sign is one thing, any number can be on the sign, it don't mean nothing, unless we have police enforcing it.

Betty Ann Bernosky: There is a Statie that sits at the end of town and those trucks crawl.

Charles Marquardt: There were three staties in town that day. They were actually sitting over by Saint Vincents.

Mark Rainis: They were up in Gilberton the other day doing a safety blitz.

Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: I have been watching them from up in my bedroom window, there were two that weren't tarped. I can't watch all of them. I sit up there because they go by every two minutes. I was behind one on Main Street and he was going 32 miles per hour.

OIC Jeremy Talanca: One of the things that there is too, we had to plan to get those speed lines up because there is a way we have to be able to prove and be able to enforce. With the roads the way they are and the weather conditions, we haven't been able to run that device to have had a way to paint those lines. If we get the lines down, which we plan on doing within the next week. That in addition to the weigh stations, we should have all angles covered, in terms of enforcement. That was the reason we were kind of hindering. We also did where we parked on the road. So there is going to be some lines painted so we can enforce it.

Mark Rainis: Safety issues is a problem. I sit and wait for my kid at the bus stop. In the morning I see the trucks go by and they are doing this, because they don't want to hit cars.

Robbie Krick: Word is out that we are watching them because the cops are out and I understand that we have a couple of Council Members out, word is out.

Mark Rainis: I have been out and I have been flagging a couple down. We were doing a couple of things with the Borough and I was telling them to slow down, slow down. What happens is right there they have cb's, they are in contact with each other. Then the next thing you know they are slowing down. We haven't had any police, because Jeremy had some issues and things like that. Once he gets back on, things are going to change. We are going to take care of it. Joe Chearetti: I am glad to hear that.

Annetta Whitecavage: They hit every pot hole that there is and it doesn't matter whether or not they are tarped, the dirt go flying.

Robbie Krick: Whether they are tarped or not, there is a half a ton of coal that is dropped. Every day.

Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: I believe that.

Robbie Krick: They are so overloaded, that it doesn't matter whether they are tarped or not.

Annetta Whitecavage: The kids are jumping in the water, they are standing there with innertubes on. They jump in, they are playing. The one kid was like, four years old, standing there with an innertube on.

Charles Marquardt: I sent the police department up to the parents, and so on and so forth.

Annetta Whitecavage: I never saw these kids before they have to be over, now they are driving wagons, by Reckless's, all the way down Silver Street. They are going to get killed.

Charles Marquardt: And I know that they are going up in his driveway and coming down flying down on bicycles.

Annetta Whitecavage: The other day, one of the Mitchell's over there on a wagon, came flying down Silver. I just saw him flying down Silver. I don't know where he came back up,

Charles Marquardt: So, the neighbor in the trailer is going to post his property from his side, we are going to talk to Reckless to see if they can also put postings down by the outside there by the thing. We are going to ask them if they come in and they will look at it and see if they give us any kind of help or direction to go. Maybe put some kind of fencing up. We are just going through the procedure there. It has gotten worse this week than the week before and more than ever and I find out that it was just a few new families moved in with some young kids. We did reach out to those families so, hopefully that will stop that part. But there is potential for any kind of thing to happen at any given time.

Annetta Whitecavage: They are two and four years old.

Charles Marquardt: I was told that they range from two to six years old. The kids with the innertubes were going to jump in, the guy at the trailer said he had to yell at them and they yelled back at him.

Annetta Whitecavage: They are at the rocks and they are going to get stuck in the grates. If they caught their arm, that would really hurt.

SOLICITOR REPORT:

Arlen Day: Yeah, Bivona. I spoke with his attorney, well, not really his attorney but, I raised the issue with the badge and the keys and possibly radios, bodycams and he said that he has a chest of stuff there that he left at his office, and he is going to contact him. He wants to give it to me to give to the Borough. So I will keep you updated on the progress on that. Maybe it is handled already. I don't know but, the attorney clearly is not representing him and doesn't want to get involved in any litigation, but he said he would be happy to get that to us to resolve that issue. If we have to file our own complaint against him, the DA will do it.

OPEN THE FLOOR FOR PUBLIC COMMENT:

Rob Krick: The lien against 124 A Street is for demolition? And the Borough paid the lien off? **Charles Marquardt**: It was supposed to be taken care of by the person's attorney but the person never paid the money. Am I correct on that?

Solicitor Arlen Day: No, actually they sent the money to us instead of sending it to the County. Either way, it didn't get paid to the County when it should have been, but I worked it out with the County that all we had to do is pay it.

Charles Marquardt: Ok, I thought it was that they were supposed to pay it.

Solicitor Arlen Day: Well, the check should have gone to the County but, I am not going to say that it anybody's fault because we had a closing and the check was made out to the Borough instead of the County. Once the estate for the lady came into play, the attorney contacted me and we found out that it wasn't paid to the County and we talked to them instead of saying that it was a breech were we would have had to pay the full amount, they were willing to take the \$1,200.00.

Annetta Whitecavage: Is that the empty lot that we had and sold?

Charles Marquardt: Yes, to her. Now she passed away and her children want to sell it. I guess they are selling both properties, the empty lot and the house.

Rob Krick: Just another question, I saw the complaint forms on the desk. Is it the Borough Code Policy that you can't act on any violation that isn't in writing?

Charles Marquardt: Yes, it is the Code Department want the complaints filed so that they have a written record and I guess it is a good thing to have, only because then we can prove whether or not, that they went down and did what they were supposed to do, because some people say something to us, we tell them and if it don't get done, then they can come back to us and say you guys didn't do nothing or this guy did nothing. So, the Code Department asks that anybody that has a complaint then they don't do anything, you don't even have to sign it, it's just that the complaint form is filled out, you guys don't do anything. Right, Danny?

Danny Cress: Yep, we have been doing this for the last three years.

Rob Krick: So, the code officer's don't act on anything unless there is a complaint?

Danny Cress: Well, it all depends on, well, 9 out of 10 times what I ask you to do is fill out a complaint form. I have been asking this for the last 3 years. If I have a complaint form, we have a record of it and we can go down there and take care of it. Okay, if people decide that they just want to ask the Borough Council and say I want this done. Well, sometimes we are doing stuff ourselves and so, I would rather have a record on paper. That way, I can go back and go down

there and check it out. Just get a complaint and fill it out, then we can go and give a ticket or whatever.

Rob Krick: We used to be pro-active.

Danny Cress: We have people that say well, I called the Borough pissed off. They come up here and they get the form and fill it out, you don't have to sign it.

Mary Beth Dougherty: So, again being proactive and not waiting for complaints, because obviously, we are all seeing crappy properties and are you are actually are not taking care of it unless, a complaint form is filled out. So far, you have done 6 citations a year.

Danny Cress: So far, I did 2 yesterday. Mary Beth Dougherty: You have 6.

Danny Cress: You don't understand how it is.

Mary Beth Dougherty: I understand exactly how it is.

Danny Cress: No, you don't, because you are not listening. How many times have you filled out a complaint form?

Mary Beth Dougherty: I am not talking about any oral complaints. I am asking if you see what everybody else sees? Get your priorities straight.

People talking over one another.

Mary Beth Dougherty: Places are falling down, I get it.

Danny Cress: Yes,

People yelling at each other.

Mary Beth Dougherty: You don't do anything. You don't do anything.

Mark Rainis; They can't do anything unless, they are aware of the situation.

Mary Beth Dougherty: **(yelling)** My point is that if I can see it so should you. So, you should be doing your job without waiting for that form. Why don't you see the same things? I am not complaining.

Mark Rainis: Danny can't do his job unless, he is made aware of it.

Mary Beth Dougherty: Bullshit

Jeremy Talanka:: Please calm down.

Rob Krick: So, why don't Council fill out complaint forms because you guys see what we see, **Mark Rainis**: Danny made it quite clear to me that he has to be made aware. You can't just go and tell your neighbor, hey, there is shit on your porch.

Mary Beth Dougherty: I am talking about being proactive. If you were proactive in the code enforcement department, then there would be more than 6 citations a year. There is stuff on sidewalks, stuff on porches. There shouldn't be any of that if, you guys were doing your job the right way. My point is that they should be aware of it.

People yelling over one another.

Mary Beth Dougherty: They need to do their job. They should see the same thing.

Charles Marquardt: I know I, for one, I notify the code office when I see them. I also notify the police department. Am I right or wrong?

Mary Beth Dougherty: When is Killian here? I understand that he has some personal issues going on, but when is he here?

Charles Marquardt: I understand that he comes and goes when he can but, he has got some personal things going on right now.

Mary Beth Dougherty: What does he do when he is here? I mean 6 Citations and 6 Quality of Life tickets. That speaks for itself. That speaks for itself.

Michelle O'Connell: (Upper Railroad Street); I am going to talk in a professional way, I am not going to scream and carry on. I am so sick and tired of a Councilman bulling my family. I filed a right-to-know, last week. There is nothing about council blocking the road on Upper Railroad. Correct?

Josephine Heffner: Correct.

Michelle O'Connell: On the 28th of March 2023. Do you guys have an ordinance on blocking a road? Barricading a road, for example, cutting down trees.

Charles Marquardt: I don't know the specifics of it, but, people that are going to be moving, cutting down trees, doing anything, should notify the Borough in advance. The Borough in turn should determine whether, first of all, the person should post the time.

Michelle O'Connell: 24 hours in advance.

Charles Marquardt: They should notify the residents in the area, especially if you are on one-way streets or anything like that. That is the way we have always done it before and then go from there, notifying the fire department, the fire chief, just in case there are emergencies, you know that the street may be closed off. The same goes for anybody digging, any kind of construction, any kind of demolition, anything like that. My understanding is that in this situation, the fire chief was notified.

Michelle O'Connell: The Borough is supposed to give the permission, correct?

Charles Marquardt: Well, if he comes to the Borough and notifies us, in case we were not notified.

Mark Rainis: I asked for a permit and there wasn't one that was required.

Michelle O'Connell: The situation was a very unprofessional way to act, as a council representative with several public officials. I know that some of us do not get along but you could act in a professional way. On the date of March 28th, 2023, my mother had gone to a doctor's appointment, the road was barricaded from...

Mark Rainis: (interrupting)

Michelle O'Connell: 88 Upper Railroad. I was not home, I was at work. There was no notification that the road would be blocked that day. No 24- hour notice. My father came out and asked for that to be removed. The response, there is a trail camera on you, on railroad property for confrontation like this, by a Borough Council Member, Mr. Rainis. How is that serving your community and acting in a professional way? Screaming, carrying on. I know that I can get the same way, A picture right here facing my property. Why do you have to put a trail camera there, facing a neighbor? My mother has been there 63 years, her homestead. Taxpayer maintaining their property, clean it up. This is the response that we get. I am so sick and tired of it, bullying, unprofessional matter.

Mark Rainis: May I respond?

Charles Marquardt: No, let her finish then you can.

Mark Rainis: Well, she looked at me, I thought she wanted me to respond.

Solicitor Arlen Day: No.

Michelle O'Connell: I am just looking around in general. Why do you put a trail camera on a citizen? Yes, there is another outlet, down William Street. But suppose there was something blocking that way? There was one open.

Mark Rainis: Both were open.

Solicitor Arlen Day: Let her finish, Mark.

Michelle O'Connell: We go to the extreme of putting this on Facebook.

Mark Rainis: (interrupting)

Solicitor Arlen Day: Mark, please let her finish and then you will get your turn.

Michelle O' Connell: Here is the story, Mr. Kessler. There are trucks, delivery trucks, resident trucks driving up on our driveway. There is a manhole on the driveway, for the sewer. If you drive over it, you are fine. The blocks are scattered at the side of the driveway. They have been up for a year. But all of a sudden, they are a problem. It is a personal vendetta. I am sick and tired of it. My parents are up here longer than anyone, and never had an issue. I am not perfect. This bullying is off the wall. I want everybody to be aware of what is going on. Unprofessional! Why can't you be part of a solution instead of being part of the problem. We have to get buddies to come after me and take pictures. Calling me names on Facebook. That's the way we go. I just want to let you guys know, in a professional matter. Charlie, Eddie, Mayor Judy Mehlbaum, thank you for your help. I appreciate everything. Thank You.

Mr. Dan O'Connell: Why us, they have been there about a year. We are getting signaled out. People yelling over each other.

Jeremy Talanka: I did not see a problem with it.

Solicitor Arlen Day: There could be a civil suit if someone gets hurt or damages their vehicle by the blocks, I mean anyone, not just you.

People yelling over one another.

Charles Marquardt: Order everyone, just calm down.

Mark Rainis: I have no idea why he was taking pictures.

People Yelling.

Mark Rainis: I will let you know how everything started.

People Yelling.

Mark Rainis Let me talk.

People yelling .:

Michelle O'Connell: It's a ballpark number.

Mark Rainis: Well, you are a liar.

People yelling again and again.

Mark Rainis: Ann Marie came down with the tree cutters and we went up to the land. There were 2 young guys there. The road wasn't blocked long. You are just mad because it happened while your Mom was at the doctor.

People Yelling and Yelling.

Solicitor Arlen Day: That is what I was talking about. You could be liable if something happened.

People yelling and yelling at each other. People talking over each other.

- d. The development of multi-municipal or regional intergovernmental cooperation initiatives and cost sharing strategies.
- e. Implementation activities recommended within the adopted STMP report.
- f. Training and capacity building activities that meet basic requirements to assist in the implementation of the plan recommendations.
- g. Contracts with professional services consultants to develop and implement recommendations related to eligible activities contained in an adopted STMP report.

Mr. Rose stated that the Strategic Management Planning program (STMP) offers tools and consultant services to improve a municipality's managerial administrative and financial capacity. (He handed out folders to some of Council and the secretary with some program plans)

He said that PA counties, cities, boroughs, towns, townships, and home rule municipalities are eligible. STMP includes grant funding (up to \$200,000) to support the hiring of independent financial consultants. Grant applications require a 50/50 local match. Reduced local cash matches may be considered based pn financial hardships. Full guidelines and application are available at dced.pa.gov/STMP.

He stated that municipalities in financial despair are eligible for this program. He stated that Mahanoy City was helped through this financial program.

David Willis: There is a lot more that you can do, besides apologize.

Robbie Krick: If he's getting a paycheck, then he should at least have a report. He should have to file a report.

Jeremy Talanka: He did give me a couple of properties that had debris and things. We started citing properties last month. We ticketed some that had excessive garbage

Mary Beth Dougherty: There shouldn't have to be somebody having to egg you on.

Jeremy Talanka: The thing is that we are limited on hours. Anything that a civilian or resident may give us, we would be happy to check it out.

David Willis: You guys shouldn't have to be told for you to act upon it. If you take a ride around town on every block there is something.

Jeremy Talanka: We are not normally code. We are taking that upon us just to help out.

Charles Marquardt: Alright, the code enforcement committee is going to reach out to Bill and see what is going on. And we will get some answers and if we have to look for a new code enforcement officer, we will. They have to be certified, right?

Edward Burns: On that note, GAMA is also helping out by issuing citations. Jeremy has cited and GAMA has too.

Ed Labie: Well, he shouldn't be getting paid if he's not doing anything.

Mark Rainis: At least the police are doing code work, with their hours being limited. You need to get the forms in and do it the right way. Frank and Danny have been stepping up to the plate. I see on facebook that everybody is bitching and moaning about it. Just come in and fill out a complaint form, that way there is a paper trail.

Robbie Krick: How many houses are on the list to be torn down? What are they, except for my garage.

Charles Marquardt: We have to wait for the Judicial Sale and see how may there are.

Robbie Krick: There's no priority, I am just asking. Is there a list?

Mark Rainis: We do have a list.

"People talking over one another"

Robbie Krick: There are twelve on East Mahanoy Avenue. There has to be 150 to 200 within the Borough, easily. There should be some kind of plan to prioritize what ones should be taken down.

Charles Marquardt: If we could get Joe Macullia's property, then all three of those properties can be taken down. That's a priority. The one next to Margaret Hailey's, we are trying to get that one taken down, the roof is off it and everything else. The code department is issuing them based on their severity and what violations there are. We got guys, like that Joe who just paid their

taxes on it. Our guys were citing him again. He has no permit and he was in there working. He has to go through the whole permit process, again.

Mary Beth Dougherty: Pottsville has a list that they follow to take properties down and it documents the problems with the property. I have caught code officers in this town just flat out lying by saying that they cited properties, when they haven't. I have talked to the magistrate and they had told me that they weren't cited. The girl at the magistrate had said that it is a long time since Girardville has cited anybody.

Michelle O'Connell: Question, is that yard sale free or is there a fee for it? Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: There is no fee for it, we have waived that.

Michele O'Connell: Do you have to register?

Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: To be on the map, you do.

Some of the subjects in the area that have been brought to my attention in the communities of Girardville, Lavelle and Ashland. I have that right in the letter that I gave to you. Most towns need sidewalk repairs or replacements. This is a big hazard in each community. Splash pads and sprinkler parks for the kids. We are currently doing a restoration of a mural in Ashland, by the Post Office. All materials are donated, and volunteers help as well. We are also painting a second wall by the Post Office. Charles Marquardt: Next: We received a list of 210 bidders for the County's Upset Sale. We didn't have any objection to them.

We received a list of properties for Girardville's Private Sale. Did we object to any of these?

Solicitor Arlen Day: Do you want me to explain?

Charles Marquardt: Yes

Solicitor Arlen Day: There is a property, we prepared a letter for and the Borough and sent it to the County regarding the \$12,500.00 or more. We did not adopt this as an Ordinance or a Resolution, so the best we can do is prepare a letter to the County. However, you have to pay me to object. Then there is the objection, file for a hearing and to appear in court and have me go to court for two hearings. All together, one gentleman paid me \$3,500.00 to appear at two hearings. So, if we are going to argue against one, you have to establish that it's worth more or that someone else is willing to bid more. Then we have to get an appraisal, if they can't rely on one or the other. So, the question is, does the Borough want to spend that much money to object to that private sale.

Annetta Whitecavage: so the Borough wrote the letter to the County for \$12,500.00, did the County honor that letter?

Solicitor Arlen Day: Well, sending a letter is one thing, but they decide, whether we object or not

Annetta Whitecavage: Are you sure they read it?

Solicitor Arlen Day: Am I sure they read it? I don't know. We can certainly send them a copy by taking it to them. You know, I have gone to objections just to see what was done without an appraisal, but you are still paying me to do something that is not our decision. But, we can certainly send a letter to the County and saying, by the way, this person bid this much and we adopted it. We voted upon the letter, but did we put it in a Resolution or Ordinance, No.

Annetta Whitecavage: Why not? Can't you put it in a Resolution or Ordinance so that it will go through.

Solicitor Arlen Day: I think that we just adopted it and sent the letter to the County because it is not our decision. If we do a Resolution, that we will not except any bids of \$12,000.00 or lower. The risk I see is that we have to object to every bid that is less than \$12,500.00. The other issue there is, no matter what we adopt, the County decides, not us. Annetta Whitecavage: I do think it is ridiculous that they are bidding \$2,000.00 on a house that is worth over thirty, or forty and they just let it rot. They are not doing anything with those homes. And, they are all from New York, New Jersey, so we are going to be back in another predicament a few years down the road they are houses that are going to have to be demolished. This is what I am looking at.

Solicitor Arlen Day: Yes, the problem you are talking about, isn't anybody in this room or at the County. What you are talking about is that the Legislator won't change the laws so that people have to fix this stuff up or it ruins the property. You can cite them, you can do this, you can do that. The law should say that if you don't fix it up within 365 days, you don't get to sell it to somebody else. It your one time chance, if you don't fix it up before you sell it, it's forfeit.

Annetta Whitecavage: For example, up by me the people are from New York that bought it and they come to visit it a couple times and that is it. Now it is falling down. The neighbor has mold everywhere from it and can't do anything about it and what does he do? We are stuck. The roof is going to fall in and then we are going to have more problems and then the town will have to pay for the demolition.

Solicitor Arlen Day: We could vote tonight for the Borough to send a letter stating that we cannot accept any bids under \$12,500.00. At most, it is something that will be read at a meeting. We are not going to pay to go there and get an appraisal. I don't recommend it but, we can do that.

Charles Marquardt: So we need a motion to send a letter to the County.

Solicitor Arlen Day: To remind the County that we object to any bids less than \$12,500.00.

Josephine Heffner: They told me that it would not apply to upset sales or judicial sales;

Solicitor Arlen Day: Who told you that? The County?

Josephine Heffner: Yes.

Solicitor Arlen Day; Well, that would make sense. Well, there you go. That ends that. The County replied that it does not pertain to upset sales or judicial sales.

"People talking over one another".

Mary Beth Dougherty: Instead of writing a letter stating what your minimum price is, why don't you get the Community to sign a petition asking for a timeframe to be implicated.

Solicitor Arlen Day: I would be willing to bet that there have been hundreds of thousands of letters sent. In every community, it is a problem and the idea is that they know. I can't

tell you why they don't change it. But I can tell you that every municipality that we represent, has the same problem.

Mary Beth Dougherty: I can tell you that there is a law that it must be brought up to code within 365 days. They changed it from eighteen months to twelve. There have been some discussions about forfeiture but, then again that there is a whole other argument on the other side about personal property rights. You would not believe the number of calls that we get. Code can do something after X amounts of citations. You would not believe the number of people that call screaming at us about you don't have any rights to tell me what to do with my property. So, do I think that you are ever going to see something like forfeiture. I just don't see that. I just don't see it happening for those reasons. You know, you have lots of reasons.

Solicitor Arlen Day: The seller is the only one who signs a deed.

Mary Beth Dougherty: And that is a level of secrecy. They should have to provide contact information. The deed could have more than one parcel number. For example, there were 30 some properties for sale, 29 in Mahanoy City and there were a couple in Girardville on one deed. All on one deed, yes. So there is a whole variety of things.

Solicitor Arlen Day: The problem is that there is that loophole, 364 days I transfer the property to somebody else.

Mary Beth Dougherty: What was the list that you said about the 200 properties? "Talking Low". They also have to send a list of Bidders out to the municipalities. You can go through them and see if there is anybody not reputable. I guess most of them on the list are from New York?

Solicitor Arlen Day: And Florida. It is Florida and every time there are like six different names. Same Address.

Annetta Whitecavage: What if a property is not worth \$12,500.00? Can there be an exception on that case?

Solicitor Arlen Day: Well, if we are going to do that, I am sure that there is a very small home somewhere that is probably ready to fall down and worth \$800.00, but if you tell them that it is \$12,500.00 you will be chasing someone away.

Mayor Judith Mehlbaum: If they only paid \$800.00, they will let it fall down, But if you tell them \$12,500.00 they may fix it up.

Solicitor Arlen Day: You are absolutely right. There is no band aid that is going to fix it. **David Willis**: Can't you do background checks or something?

Solicitor Arlen Day: What I do is,

"People talking over each other".

Solicitor Arlen Day: Let me finish, we are not allowing the sale, that's the County that is selling it. We get to object. To say, yes or no.

"People talking low and over each other"

David Willis: You know that one that says a Landlord or Property Manager must live within so many miles of their property. How comes we have the power to do that, but we can't do something about this?

Judith Mehlbaum: That is rental properties.

David Willis: What about on the Judicial Sale they are buying it to use as a rental property? That's my question.

Judith Mehlbaum: Because it is a Judicial Sale. We have say over a private sale, but not a Judicial Sale.

David Willis: Well, what I mean are the people buying on a Judicial Sale held to the same standard of accountability? The ones using them as rental properties? That is my question.

Solicitor Arlen Day: I do not know what you mean about accountability?

Annetta Whitecavage: They would still be required to have a manager.

"People talking over one another".

Solicitor Arlen Day: I can send a letter. Yes, I can send a letter.

"People talking over one another".

Charles Marquardt: Another thing is that we received a notification about our liquid fuel allocation. Next year it its going to be \$40,280.04. So that has gone up some. Currently Burkhardt is replacing the furnace in Borough Hall. So, hopefully by Friday, it is up and running. They took the old one out and are putting the new one in. Then they are also putting a hot water heater in. So then we don't have to run the heater as much in the summer for the hot water, or even in the winter for hot water.

c. We need a motion to approve that Entech will prepare all paperwork for the Borough to apply for the 2023 Local Share Grant for the South William's Street Stormwater Project at a cost of \$4,000.00. A motion was made by Mark Rainis and seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote: All. Motion Carried.

Charles Marquardt: Hopefully we get it. That project needs a bid, then we can proceed to get the Grant.

Alex Gregis: I am having problems with mud being caused by the coal trucks. With the rain it is flushing the mud down under my foundation. There is no drain there, not a curb either. So, when we get a heavy rain, it is running down to my grass.

Charles Marquardt: Well, you would have to let Butler Township know. The are replacing or fixing that bridge down there. I will talk to the engineer from the firm of the company replacing the bridge.

Next, there is the **Schuylkill County Mitigation Plan**. Their Partner Meeting is coming up. Our guys are going to it.

Next, we received a letter from the landfill association. Plans are currently underway to close the **North Schuylkill Landfill in Turkey Run.** There are 13 municipalities that are chartered, and we are one of them. Then there are four that are non-charter members. Our landfill representatives will attend their meeting to see what is happening.

Robbie Krick: You can stop them from using them on East Mahanoy Avenue. Just say, do not use your jake brakes on East Mahanoy Avenue.

Charles Marquardt: You can pick block sections of town. You just have to put the signage up saying that they are restricted.

Council. There's nothing we can do for you at this point. In that aspect, there's a process PSP has. If you had a firearm removed from you, to obtain it back. So everything will go through them when it comes to anything like that.

The only thing we would have to supply ourselves is the paper that we will be printing on for the new printer, and then to set up the software and as well being on call on any problems with the printer. \$240 a month, I believe that is less than what we are spending on toner right now for a machine, they will handle all labor for it. Handle all maintenance for it. And the toner, the only thing we would have to supply. Ourselves is the paper that we will be printing on for the new preprinter. And then to set up the software and I'm call on any problems with the sad printer \$240 a month. I believe that is less than what we are spending on toner right now for a device that is capable of doing what we needed to do. That quote is subject to change at any point if we would need more paper or I'm sorry if we need more copies printed around the holidays is a good example, for hanging Christmas Decorations or anything on the polls. Printing more than we would the rest of the year off that quote. With that being said, we are working on getting emails for ourselves, so that should bring our printing down, which would bring the cost down. But I'm looking at soliciting that we go through with this lease. So that we're not spending as much on toner and that we don't have to. We make 80,000 copies a year. I was shocked when they printed the report out. 80,000 copies is (Tammy is saying something. Can't hear what she's saying) ludacris. I could not believe it and we need to step into the digital age. Like I said, once we step into the digital age and get the email and everything forwarded to us that quote will go down from the \$240, but the \$240 is what we are doing right now. I would like a motion to order it. Charlie - Motion on the floor. Motion made by Brian Dempsey, Seconded by Tammy Zangari. Vote. All. Motion Carried. Charlie — So that will be for Edward's Business System and the cost would be \$240 a month.
- 6. Charlie Next on the agenda, we had discussions on these Games of Chances and it is going to be tabled right now. We are still investigating that's insisting of the skilled games and

business and stuff like that. Other Municipalities do have these Ordinances. So we are looking at other ordinances to see if we can comply with them and possibly do something too.

David Willis — Charlie, every Borough in our area are getting \$200 or \$300 per machine and that would help us financially and entirely as a Borough. There are some places in this town that has up to 10 machines. That's a significant chunk of change that we can be using to fund this town and take some of the financial burden off our bonstituos.

Arlen — Just on that note. Currently, there is a Borough that's about to adopt rates for jukeboxes, which would include any kind of music machine \$50 per device per year, mechanical amusement devices and dart boards and things like that. A \$100 per device per calendar year, but the actual skill games where you're in there, but not really gambling, but they don't consider it gambling. You're in there trying to make money. They would be a \$1000 per device per year. I know a \$1000 per year. Lier might sound like a lot, but if you knew how much money those machines were making it's a rigidance. So that's just one nearby Borough that plans to do that, so

Mayor Michael — It should be known that non-profit entities would be exempt from those permit costs.

John Smolock — from the audience said such as.

David — The Legion

Mayor Michael — Yes.

Charlie — Okay we'll have more of a discussion on that at the following meeting.

7. Charlie — Next on the agenda is the St. Patrick's Day Parade, which we have to meet with the Parade Committee and go over some details and stuff and see exactly where we are going with this. We don't know any, We have a bunch of Council people here who have issues and concerns. We need to work these things out and see what's going to happen. So by next meeting we should have a Work Session with the Parade Committee. Go over and see what's going to happen and we'll get back at the next meeting with an answer on it. David — It's important to be known to the public that we don't have police here in town anymore. There are jurisdiction issues and the Sheriff's Office won't be available that day to give us coverage for a parade or the block party over on Beech Street.

9. Charlie — Next is Resolution 12-19-2024-2 Appoint Auditor

Arlen — 12-19-2024-2 is the fiscal year to appoint the auditor and appointment again is will be the same as last year L. Sam Deegan.

Charlie — We need a motion to appoint L. Sam Deegan are auditor. Motion made by Tammy Zangari, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. **Vote. All. Motion Carried**.

10. Charlie — Next Resolution 12-19-24-3 Appoint Financial Institution.

Arlen — This is Resolution appointing Mid Penn Bank as the depository for the Borough for the year 2025. Tammy Zangari said I'll make a motion, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried. Charlie — Now, before I go any further on the bank checking accounts and stuff like that, Councilman Kessler had asked to be removed from it and we need a motion here to appoint Tammy Zangari on the checking for the Borough. Arlen, it would be signatory. Charlie — I'm sorry to be signatory on that. David Willis made the motion, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

12. Charlie — Next is Resolution 12-19-2024-5 Demolition 324 and 326 West Ogden Street. Arlen — This is a Resolution for Demolition of 324 and 326 West Ogden Street done through the County, and the cost is \$67,700.

Charlie — We need a motion to approve the Resolution for the Demolition of 324 and 326 West Ogden street. Wait, someone from the audience has a question.

Virginia McMonegal — When is that stated to be done?

Charlie — It's not stated yet. It's still going through with the commissioners and all.

Virginia McMonegal — Okay, I guess we'd talk to Mike Soucheck and we noticed that the door was open next to us. That vacant home, he said the County was in there. But the door is still open and that's not good. The inside door is opened and it needs to be closed.

Charlie — We own that now.

Virginia McMonegal — I didn't want to go up and shut it, Charlie.

Charlie - We will go and secure the building tomorrow (Friday, December 20th, 2024).

Virginia and Mouse McMonegal — Okay, Thank you.

Mouse McMonegal – 324 that still has the power on and the roofs in. **Virginia** – Fell in. **Mouse** – Fell in.

Charlie – The power is still hooked up at 324? Mouse and Virginia – Yeah. Mayor Michael – I will put a call in tomorrow (Friday, December 20th 2024) as well. Mouse-yeah, okay. Charlie – Okay Charlie – How about 326 is the power off in there? Mouse and Virginia – That's pulled, yeah. Charlie – Okay. Mouse- Now I have one more thing. I have a wall. David – Mouse can I bug you to stand at the podium and announce your name so the recorder catches your name and records it.

David—You don't have to stand at the podium. Stand next to it to get the formality. Mouse –No, it's Okay(people are laughing). Mouse state your address. Mouse – Wait till I get up here. Hi, how are you doing? What I wanted to ask you about is that I have a wall. My retaining wall is holding the back of that house up. It's crushing it and now it's all cracked up and everything from holding the back of that house up. Now, am I responsible or who is responsible for that? Because once they crush that building that's going to come out. Arlen and Charlie — Let's check into that for sure. Arlen — Yeah, check into that. Charlie — Let me find out for sure Mouse.

It's holding it up. David — Did you check with your insurance? Mouse – No. David — Just out of curiosity, Virginia – I'll tell you what we really don't want to bring our insurance into it. David — No I don't blame you. Virginia–2 vacant houses on each side of us, they might drop us. David — I totally get it. Charlie – Okay. Thank you Patrick. David – Thank you, Mouse.

13. Charlie - Next is Resolution 12-19-2024-6 Demolition of 24 East Ogden Street. Arlen - Did you vote on it? Mayor - Yeah, you already voted on it. Arlen - Not this one, the one before it. Mayor — The reason why that cost is so high is because there is no foundation between that and the occupied structure aside of it. So they have to put a foundation in. Charlie - That's why we want to find out if they checked that and it was in the bid. Mouse and Virginia - No one came on our back porch. Charlie - We'll find out. Charlie — We need a motion for the Demolition at 20 East Preston Avenue. Tammy made the motion, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

Arlen — When the County does it, it doesn't mean Girardville hands them \$77,500. The County puts a lien on the property and if the property is sold, it has to be sold at Fair Market Value. It doesn't have to be sold at \$77,500 it just has to be sold at Fair Market Value. The Fair Market Value obtained from it does go back to the County.

Virginia — yeah, OK.

Charlie — We were also told that anybody interested in purchasing properties would have to get the appraisal done and pay for the appraisal. The Borough does not do that, pay for the appraisal.

Virginia — Right

Charlie — Anybody after property next to them or wherever, they would have to get the appraisal done to get the fair market value. It's roughly around \$400.

15. Charlie - Next Resolution 12-19-2024-8 Line of Credit

Arlen — This is to get the Tax Anticipation Note in the amount of \$40,000 and it's for the year 2025 and it's through Mid Penn Bank. The loan amount is \$40,000. The rate is quoted at 75% of Wall Street Journal Prime Rate. Interest only on money on mounted advanced principle due maturity and we do have the Proposal from Mid Penn Bank which is attached to the Resolution that would be accepted and we have the Tax Anticipation Note also attached as an Exhibit as well as the Certification of Taxes to be collected in 2025, which is \$423,080.

Charlie — Okay, that we need a motion to approve Resolution.12-19-2024-8 Line of Credit. Motion made by Tammy Zangari, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried. Arlen — The Proposal \$40,000 at the prime rate 7.6 currently at 7.75, but it's quoting at 75% Wall Street Journal Prime. We need to approve the Proposal. Tammy made the motion, Seconded by David Willis. Arlen — Also a motion for the Anticipation Note itself. Charlie — We need a motion for the Anticipation Note. Motion made by Brian Dempsey, Seconded by Tammy Zangari. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

16. Land Bank Tammy, We will not be renewing with the Land Bank in 2025. Tammy read the letter that is going to be sent to the Lanb Bank. Charlie — North Schuylkill School isn't in it. Arlen — North Schuylkill School isn't in it there's no reason for you to be in it. Tammy, Said right. Charlie — We need a motion to send the letter to the Land Bank. Will remain by David Willis Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

17. We have the Code Enforcement Officer position. Michael asked Charlie, did he want him to do it? Charlie said yep. Michael - We had multiple candidates. We did interviews the other Sunday for 6 hours. It was the recommendation of Council and Code Committee that Nicholas Haslen be put into the position of Code Enforcement Officer. He has a contract and the contract is for \$1,000 a month for 25 hours. How that breaks down is outside of that 25 hours, he's required to be at every Work Session. He's available 24/7 for emergencies, excluding holidays. Or vacations, but we'll know ahead of time. He will be set up when you call the Code Officer. It will go directly to his cell phone whatever you need. Part of his responsibilities, he has 24 hours to respond to a code complaint. This is how his job description and agreement is set up with us. He has 24 hours to respond to a code complaint, excluding holidays. He must respond back to the person who made the complaint with what's going on with the issue, If there's citations filed or if nothing's found. Whatever the case may be, if you don't submit it anonymously. Of course, if you've sent it anonymously, I'm gonna say there's no way to send it back to you. We will be working on him to bring it up a little bit so we can do things by email where the things that are a little bit more streamlined. Part of his recommendation, trial is he will obtain the permit officer's position. So we thank Jean Ann for her years, but that position will be added to his past. The agreement with us is for one calendar year. Then we can assess it from there without going into great detail. We have a pretty good description from him that we signed an agreement. If he does not fulfill his duties, then we'll be able to go back and save it. Okay, you're not doing your job. It's pretty black & white, you're right. He seems very, very eager to help us. He currently works at 7 other my musicalities in school of county. One of which is fractal, which is locally. If

he's a younger guy who brings some good ideas. I won't speak for everyone but I was quite impressed with him. I think he will be a good fit. So that's our recommendation, if anyone from council has anything to add, then we need to hire him as of January 1st. Charlie – We need a motion to hire Nicholas Hanslen as the new code enforcement officer effectively January 1st and permanent officer effectively January 1st 2025.

Tammy Zangari made a motion, Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

18. Charlie- Next is the Code Officer Aide. Michael again. We had multiple candidates interview. The one that stuck out the most with myself and the council was Janet Perez. She is a retired New York Police Officer who brings a lot of experience. She is by lingual, fluent in Spanish in different dialogues and in English. Her talents will be used for I'm sure for more than just code work. I feel she's going to be a good fit. If Council agrees, I'd like to appoint her Code Enforcement Officer Aid starting January 1st, it should be noted that if in fact we do tax on the skilled games that part of that responsibility would fall to her, which would upset the cost to that position, someone from the audience, asking a question.

Right? Our primary concern is Quality of Life citations. She'll follow the same policy that Nick will. So, if there's a complaint for Quality of Life it's the same response time all that will be uniformed. She'll work with Nick in that aspect. So we need a motion for that to appoint her for Code Enforcement Officer Aid effectively January 1st 2025. Motion made by Tammy Zangari, Seconded by David Willis. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

David - I just want to point out too, the Aid position is strictly an aid position, so we're not tying up the Code Enforcement Officer Nick Hanslen who has bigger fish to fry. There's houses falling down and everything like that. This is more for small things like overgrown, grass, not that they're not a problem, but obviously they are a problem, but we should use the experienced person for the rest of the living in their hands and take on the bigger issues. Someone from the audience asked what is the salary on that? David- a grand a month. The person from the audience said what's that? David - a grand month. Mayor - said no David. David- Oh Mayor -The Code Enforcement Lady Position is 15 hours a week. No more than 30 a pay period and is \$15 an hour. That individual will be required to clock in and out like everyone else. Nick's is a contract. Just so the public is aware part of Nick's agreement is we have to get we're going to get a comprehensive report every month with a breakdown of those 25 hours were spent. So he has to provide us with pretty much documentation. So we're not going to deal with no reports that we don't know what's going on. That's over. They are also going to use Nick's experience to revamp on how we handle rental properties in this town. Because obvious it's an issue. So we are going to use his experience to see what we can do better and make sure inspections are taking place and everything like that.

Charlie – Okay, so it's \$15 an hour and no more than 30 hours pay period. Tammy Zangari made the motion, Seconded by David Willis. Vote. All. Motion Carried.

19. Secretary/Treasurer David can I do Secretary/Treasurer? Charlie— Yeah. Arlen — go ahead. David—So we met with several candidates for the secretary-treasurer position. None of our candidates had experience as municipal secretary. We do have a secretary candidate who is used to working with laws and regulations with her previous job history and we took that as a benefit. Other things can be taught, such as Quickbooks, Excel and everything like that. There's

courses all over the place and there are other options that we can explore for that, but it's my recommendation for the Council that we employ Harley Ingersoll. She's here from town for our Borough Secretary position, I think she's going to be a great fit. I think she has tons of computer experience. I think her experience in the field she worked in prior to this is going to be great for customer service. I think she'll be great for the constituents. I think it's going to be a great fit for all of us as well.

Charlie – you heard the motion by David Willis. Tammy Zangari seconded. Vote. All. Motion Carried. A female from the audience said David salary. David – Okay, so what we're going to do is Jo is going to stay here for 2 weeks. That's what the ideal plan is to train her. Jo will be receiving a 50 Cent raise at that time. During the 90 day probation period for a secretary the secretary will be receiving \$15 an hour for that probation period. That is, after that probation period. Oh I'm sorry \$15.50 after that probation period it goes up to Michael– It can David – it can go up depending on experience and how it's working out \$18. So that's the game plan. The better that Harley works with us. The more she's working. It's as simple as that with any of our jobs. Harley's actually in the room. She's right there in the yellow shirt, if you want to say hello, she's going to be a familiar face in here anyway.

Charlie – Okay, We need a motion. Tammy Zangari said I'll make the motion. Seconded by Brian Dempsey. Vote. All. Motion Carried. Charlie – On that note our current secretary/treasurer is retiring at the end of the month, but she's willing to stay on to assist Harley getting set up and if anything is needed she's a phone call away. Charlie – Said congratulations Harley. Mayor – 2 things tied with the secretary one is business hours at the Borough Hall will be altered slightly. The new schedule will be 7 AM to 3:30 PM with lunch from 12 PM to 12:30 PM where the office will be closed. So the public is aware and that be posted and become effective January 2nd. Also, I'm requesting from Council that we make a motion, if we need Josephine to fill in if Harley is off for a period for vacation or something that we can bring Josephine in per diem rate.
